I am pleased to announce the Washington Township Committee has chosen Thomas J. Cicerelle as the Township's new Police Chief. Chief Cicerelle was sworn into office on January 1, 2016 and replaces longtime Police Chief James J. McDonald, Sr. who retired at the end of 2015 after 30 years of service to Washington Township. Chief Cicerelle began his law enforcement career in Washington Township in 1987 as a Patrolman. Since then, he has advanced through the Police Department ranks, serving as a Corporal, Sergeant, Lieutenant and most recently Deputy Chief.

Throughout his career, Chief Cicerelle has worked in the following capacities: K-9 Handler, SWAT officer on the Warren County Tactical Response Team and as a Detective assigned to the Warren County Narcotics Task Force. He is a graduate of the 13-week Command and Leadership Academy taught by the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police as well as the Mid-Atlantic Law Enforcement Executive Development Training Program proctored by the FBI.

Some of Chief Cicerelle's initial goals are to:

- Update policies and procedures
- Provide his officers with the necessary training and tools to respond to the ever changing needs of the community
- Improve and expand upon the Department's foundation of strong Community Oriented Policing Traditions.

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Hawk Pointe and Hunterdon Healthcare Breaks Ground for New Medical Office Building

Ground was broken on January 8th by Developers Richard Cotton, Randall Welsh and President and CEO of Hunterdon Healthcare, Robert P. Wise, for a new medical office building that will be constructed in the village of Hawk Pointe in Washington, NJ.

“Our idea has always been to create a sustainable, environmentally friendly village that has what our community needs all in one area. We have our food source, Shop-Rite of Washington, Vision Credit Union for our financial needs, Hawk Pointe Golf Club and mixed retail for recreation and we now will add our health and wellness component which is this new building. We are proud to have Hunterdon Healthcare be part of this,” stated Richard Cotton.



The building will be two floors, 25,000 square feet and Hunterdon Healthcare will occupy the first floor which will be 12,500 square feet. Hunterdon Family Medicine at Riverfield will move their Washington office into this new location and will expand their services to include walk in appointments. In addition, Hunterdon Behavioral Health and Physical and Occupational Therapy will also move into the new building. Currently these offices are located in Washington Borough.

In addition to Hunterdon Healthcare on the first floor we are currently in the process of identifying additional healthcare providers for the second floor to support the needs of the village and surrounding area.

“This has been a project we started to discuss 20 years ago. We are pleased to be part of a vision that will provide residents with better access to health care in Warren County”, stated Robert P. Wise, President and CEO, Hunterdon Healthcare.

GRASS CLIPPINGS: Will **not** be picked up curbside. May be taken to the Port Colden Convenience Center along with garden variety waste and leaves, and placed in the separately marked holding areas by obtaining a Convenience Center Pass (see fees).



CHRISTMAS TREES: (no fee required) will be picked up curbside. Must be placed at curbside by 6:00 a.m. **Thursdays**, January - February; or can be dropped off at the Convenience Center.

FEES: Convenience Center Annual Fee: \$ 30.00 Curbside Collection Annual Fee: \$ 50.00



Waste Water Management Plan

With the recent approval of the Waste Water Management Plan (WWMP) by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP), there is an expanded area along Route 31 that can be served by sewer. This will be a major economic tool since the availability of sewer allows for a more flexible design. This will allow for existing and new businesses to tie into the sewer, eliminating the need for septic systems. This now becomes a more viable solution to bringing in retail stores, restaurants, etc. which will help grow our rateables, stabilize our tax base and provide more jobs for the community. The next phase of the Waste Water Management Plan will be researching the options and strategies for implementation of the sewer infrastructure.

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History of the Dick Flint Natural Area

The Washington Water Company acquired the property in the early 1880's to supply water for the town of Washington after a series of fires affected the town's main industry which was organ and piano manufacturing. A caretaker responsible for maintaining the springs and reservoir lived on the farm site which consisted of a house, a milk house, a barn, a pig shed, and several out buildings. The farm was torn down in the 1960's, but two large trees, foundations, and the ruins of the milk house mark the spot where the farm once stood.

The property, acquired by Washington Township in 1999, is part of 400 acres that is named Roaring Rock Park. In 2011, the 139 acre parcel on the north side of Harmony-Brass Castle Road was named in honor of Dick Flint's 20+ years of dedication to the passive and active recreation areas in Washington Township. The 1.9 mile perimeter trail that passes the farm site was developed with the help of Warren Hills students.

Washington Township Warren County Passive Recreational Parks

ROARING ROCK PARK

Four hundred one (401) acres, both sides of Brass Castle-Harmony Road and also Brass Castle Road. Property was purchased from New Jersey American Water Company in 1999 for preservation.

Access is on Brass Castle-Harmony Road, at the park sign. The short access road and parking area were completed by the Washington Township Department of Public Works in 2000. Trail maps are available at the parking area.

In 1999, a 1.9 mile challenging hiking trail (white diamond markers) was completed. It includes two creek crossings, with bridges, and reaches the "summit" (975 ft. elevation) of the southern section (262 acres).

In 2002 we completed another hiking trail (blue diamond markers) in the easterly area to the summit (0.8 mile). In addition, a picnic area and short "easy" trail have been completed.

In 2005, we developed hiking trails on the northern section (139 acres).

In general, the terrain is heavily wooded (mostly hardwoods, a few pine and cedar trees). The trails are challenging in some parts of the southern section. The property includes a pond and Brass Castle Creek. Limited hunting is allowed for deer, September through February, so be sure to wear blaze orange during hunting season or hike on Sundays.

LAKE MARGUERITE WILDLIFE REFUGE

Twenty-two (22) acres off Jonestown Road. Access is from Jonestown Road, at park sign. Established in 1981 with a donation of property by John Lundy.

Lake Marguerite Wildlife Refuge consists of a small pond (about one acre) and 0.7 mile of trails/roads with four (4) bridges across flowing streams. The bridges and trail benches were built and erected by students and faculty from Project Excel School.

The terrain is flat with open fields, wooded areas, wetlands and a creek. Fishing is limited to children 14 years and younger at Lake Marguerite.

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GRIFFITH WOODS NATURAL AREA

Forty-four (44) acres off Jonestown Road. There are two access points, one at the northeasterly end of Lake Marguerite Wildlife Refuge and the other on Jonestown Road about ½ mile east of the entrance to Lake Marguerite. Park signs identify access points. Established in 1998 with a donation of property by Dr. and Mrs. William Griffith.

In 1998/99, a 1.8 mile hiking trail was completed. There is a “perimeter” trail (red diamond markers) and a short “connector” trail (white diamond markers). Trail maps are available at entrances.

The terrain is fairly flat, some rocky areas and a few wet sections (especially in the spring). There are two streams that are crossed by the trails with a bridge built in 2004 as an Eagle Scout project.

POHATCONG CREEK NATURAL AREA

Ninety-one (91) acres along the Pohatcong Creek, east of Mine Hill Road, behind Warren Hills Regional High School and south of Fairway Valley Golf Course. Access is off Mine Hill Road at parking area near the Robert Rush Memorial Cabin and the park sign.

A short hiking trail was extended by the Warren Hills Environmental Club in 2004. Total trail distance is 1.7 miles on both sides of Pohatcong Creek, with two bridges. Trail markers are white on the south side (0.9 mile) and blue on the north side (0.8 mile)

A picnic area, which was an Eagle Scout project in 2003, and native plant arboretum are located near the cabin.

The arboretum, planted in 2003, was a project organized by the Rutgers Cooperative Extension. Students from Warren Hills Regional High School and other volunteers assisted.

The terrain is heavily wooded with wetlands north of the creek. The creek is also stocked with trout.

SPRINGTOWN ROAD NATURAL AREA

Twenty (20) acres off Springtown Road across from Hawk Pointe Golf Course. Access is from Springtown Road (Nature Trail Sign) however, parking is difficult along Springtown Road.

There is a 0.75 mile nature trail (loop) that was made by the 4-H Club (white diamond trail markers).

The terrain is up hill from Springtown Road and heavily wooded.

MILL POND ROAD/ROUTE 57 WEST PROPERTY

This property consists of 87 acres with open fields, woodlands on both sides of the Pohatcong Creek. Development is currently restricted except for passive recreation - hiking & fishing.

History of Meadow Breeze Park

Meadow Breeze Park is a 70 acre active recreation area maintained by the Washington Township Public Works Department and managed by the Washington Township Recreation Commission.

The “Old Park” consists of 26 acres on the north side of Brass Castle Creek. The “Old Park” contains a football field (F1), baseball/softball fields (D1-D4), a soccer/lacrosse field (S4), and areas for whistle soccer and T-ball. There are also horseshoe pits, a food stand, tennis courts, a playground, a basketball court, an announcing booth and a field house. On the northern end of the “Old Park” is a section of the Morris Canal with a walking trail. The Canal basin can be used for ice skating in the winter months. The old Municipal Building on the north side of the canal is now used for parks and recreation.


The “New Park” was completed in 2001. The project was funded through a Green Acres Grant. The “New Park” consists of 54 acres with sections on both sides of Meadow Breeze Lane. There are four soccer/lacrosse fields (S1-S4), three baseball/softball fields (D5-D7), sand volley ball courts and three basketball courts.

On the east side of Meadow Breeze Lane there is a large playground facility, a pavilion and restroom facilities. The “New Park” has nearly 2 miles of paved walking trails.




MEADOW BREEZE PARK

Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of our stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.



As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.

As a resident, business or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it. Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze and paints.
- Do not pour any of your hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated.
- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.

Keep pollution out of storm drains

- Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies.
- Do not let sewage or other waste flow into a stormwater system.

Clean up after your pet

- Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.
- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.



- Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. And remember to:

- Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes.
- Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or un-wrapped in a toilet.
- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.
- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits feeding in these areas.

Don't litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.
- Participate in community cleanups.

Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.
- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.
- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

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


Radiology services include X-ray, Mammography, Ultrasound and Dexascan. Convenient appointments are available, including Saturdays. Call 908-859-8880.
